Christmas at Our Partner Church

There is a stone church at a crossroads in the center of the village of Gagy (pronounced *Gahje* with a hard g) in the Transylvania section of Romania. A banner on the outside, in Hungarian, Romanian, and English, celebrates 450 years of Transylvania, Land of Religious Freedom. The Gagy church is affiliated with the Unitarian Church of Transylvania, which adopted religious ideals recognizable to us before the Pilgrims landed on these shores.

This is our partner church. Since 2010 several members of First Parish and the Gagy church have made pigrimages in either direction. Reverend Zoli and his wife, Magdika, have visited Arlington twice. I still remember the congregation gasping when it was revealed that Magdika was enjoying two *years* of maternity leave. I asked Rev. Zoli to share some of his congregation's Christmas traditions. He wrote:

On Christmas Eve we celebrate in the church, and children recite poems and sing Christmas carols. We usually decorate the Christmas tree earlier with the youth, and prepare gifts for younger children in the local shop. In Transylvania and in Hungary the angel brings gifts to children instead of Santa Claus. Santa arrives on the sixth of December, so kids get presents twice in the last month of the year.

On the first day of Christmas we have church service and share communion. Usually for this service we have the greatest attendance. On this day we have a service in the small village of Kismedesér, two miles away from us, up in the valley. There are a couple of people, and a small church on the hill. On the second and third day of Christmas we have regular church services.

On the third day of Christmas packages usually arrive from Germany, which are given to the old members of our congregation. These packages contain flour, rice, sugar, oil, chocolate, and other things that can be used in their daily life.

Once I asked an old lady from our community what she got for Christmas. She said, "Nothing," and I sensed sadness in her voice. I told her she was wrong because I was sent to deliver her Christmas present. Her face became happy and she started to smile. That was the moment when I understood how meaningful our job is.

This is how we celebrate Christmas, and it is always the most memorable period of the year.

Parlor Exhibit Coming in February

A goal of the Welcoming Congregation Committee (WCC) is to prioritize our collective and continuing growth in knowledge and understanding of people's lives and experiences, learning especially from people with marginalized sexual and gender identities across different generations. As part of our work, we are happy to sponsor an exhibit by Jess T. Dugan in the Parlor from February 11 to April 11.

Between 2013 and 2018, Jess T. Dugan (they/them) created To Survive on This Shore: Photographs and Interviews with Transgender and Gender Nonconforming Older Adults (over 50) in collaboration with Dr. Vanessa Fabbre (she/her), a social work scholar. The project documents life stories from this underrepresented group and offers reflections on what it means to live authentically in the face of difficult challenges. The Parlor exhibit is a selection of 17 of these photographs and interviews from across the United States focused on lives lived within the intersections of gender identity, race, ethnicity, sexuality, socioeconomic class, and geographic location. The WCC has purchased two copies of the book which includes all 65 portraits and interviews from the project. After the exhibit, the books will remain in the FPUU library. Jess is an internationally known photographer whose work has been widely exhibited and is in the permanent collections of over 45 museums, including the Smithsonian National Portrait Gallery, the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston, and the Library of Congress. We are grateful to Jess for enabling us to exhibit their art in support of our continuing commitment to growth as a Welcoming Congregation. Jess's desire for their work is that it will be in spaces accessible to all where it is seen and generates dialogue and conversations. Jess says, "My intention is to create work that facilitates intimacy and encourages empathy, understanding, and critical conversations about identity and contemporary social life." Drawing from their experience as a queer, non-binary person, Jess says their work is motivated by an existential need to understand and express themself, to connect with others, and to "continually explore what it means to live authentically and how visual representation plays a powerful role in that process."

Jess explains that "seeing yourself reflected in others can be lifesaving. It can relieve isolation, negativity, and offer hope and a sense of belonging. Images in portraits and showing up and being seen in your fullness as yourself are political and social actions that resist the status quo; that resist erasure and insist on visibility through authentic representation. Images help us understand ourselves and our world better. They help us broaden our understanding of who is in the world around us that we may not have noticed before." Jess's work pushes back against the fetishizing and negative imagery that often reduces the complexity of trans and gender-diverse people's lives to body parts in order to create more richly human and positive images. The portraits and narratives create an intimacy that draws us in and allows us to identify

with the person in the image who is making direct eye contact with us. On a fundamental level, Jess says they "want to facilitate an emotional exchange between the viewers of my photographs and the subjects of my photographs. What that is exactly depends on who's viewing the work and what they bring to it." Jess hopes that their work resonates with and inspires people to reflect on their own lives, identities, and ways of being who they are in the world and in relationships.

An opening reception in the Parlor after the February 11 service will have opportunities for people to offer thoughts, reflections, and ideas sparked by the exhibit.

Jess will give a talk in Boston on April 13 from 1 to3pm, for the Photographic Resource Center at Lesley University. Jess says, "It would be awesome if First Parish members could come!" The WCC plans to buy a block of on-line tickets and organize a watch gathering in the Vestry.
