Ready to Leap Forward

As many of us may already know, the New Year that we are bravely setting forth upon is a leap year. Of the many significant events we will experience in 2020, the fact that we will have a whole extra day — February 29 — to work or play with is probably not at the top of most people's thoughts. But for those of us on the Stewardship Committee, it looms large, because that day will usher in what we hope will be a big Leap Forward (that's this year's theme!) in First Parish's ability to do its good work: the 2020 Stewardship Campaign, which will take place from March 1 to 15.

Our church is well on the way toward hiring a second minister to help Rev. Marta and the rest of our staff expand their ability to minister to us and to the community around us. Hiring this additional minister



will take significant funds. We have already made a good start toward financing this, but ensuring that this step is sustainable will require us all to be good stewards, giving generously of our hearts and treasure.

In order to nurture the many worthy activities in which we are engaged at First Parish, this year's Stewardship Campaign will include arranging for volunteers to have one-to-one conversations with as many members as possible. We will talk about what we value about our faith community and how each of us can help contribute to it by making — and, we hope, increasing — our annual pledge to the church.

In early February we will be training our volunteers — 65 of them! — in how to initiate the intimate talks with you that we hope will allow us all to Leap Forward in 2020.

First Aid for Mental Health

In January you can learn how to perform Mental Health First Aid in a two-class course. You will learn a five-step action plan to help someone experiencing a mental-health crisis. The plan equips you to help loved ones, friends, neighbors, colleagues, and others cope with mental-health or substance-use disorders.

The course will be held at First Parish on two Saturday mornings — January 19 and 25, from 9 am to 1 pm. The instructors are First Parish member Ellen Faran and Joanne Grady-Savard, Executive Director of the Cole Resource Center. Attendance at both sessions is required, and a \$50 fee includes a substantial manual. Participation is limited to 30 people.

- Rosa Parks had a lot of company in her work for equality. Learn more about Jo Ann Robinson and other courageous women in Robinson's memoir, The Montgomery Bus Boycott and the Women Who Started It.
- Parents, check out Hate Hurts: How Children Learn and Unlearn Prejudice, which offers practical tips, sound advice, and role-playing to deal with difficult situations.
- Have you visited the African Meeting House on Beacon Hill? There you'll find the school that features in Sarah's Long Walk, about the fight to end legal segregation in Boston public schools.
- In Unitarian Universalists of Color, 15 contributors share their stories of love, challenges, faith journeys, hope, and despair.

Hosting Our Guests from Gagy

It's been a long time since First Parish had visitors from Gagy (2012, to be exact), but this summer we finally succeeded in hosting a multigenerational group from our partner congregation in the village of Gagy (pronounced "Godge"), in Transylvania, Romania.

Back in 2012, Rev. Zoltan Gal (Zoli) and his wife, Magdika, made their first visit to Arlington after Marta led our initial visit to Gagy in 2011, right after First Parish voted unanimously to partner with Gagy at a congregational meeting in 2010.

From August 28 to September 4, three new visitors from Gagy (in addition to Zoli and Magdika) made the journey. They included the ex-President of the Gagy congregation, Mihaly Pal, his wife, Edit, and youth group leader Arpad Fazakas, none of whom had flown on a plane before, much less visited the U.S.

The groundwork for this visit was laid about a year ago, when we realized that it really could happen. A planning committee was formed, led by myself as interim chair, with Holly Herring, John and Carol Chamberlain, Ellen Leigh, Julie Dunn, Jo Anne Preston, John Burt, and Julius Pereli.

Because having a partner church is a congregational-level commitment, our goal was to engage and get support from as many First Parish people and groups as possible, especially since our visitors represented a broad cross-section of the Gagy congregation. Through the hard work of the committee, we were able to obtain financial support from the Parish Committee (who made a pledge contingent on us raising a certain amount first), the Women's Alliance, visitors to Gagy

from previous trips, and dozens of individual First Parish members. Using the Realm congregational-membership software made individual contributions easy. We were also lucky enough to be awarded a \$500 grant directly from the Unitarian Universalist Partner Church Council.

And I haven't even mentioned fundraising events yet. We started with a small nest egg from previous events, such as the annual Transylvanian folk dancing event organized by Ellen Leigh. The largest fundraiser was the Hungarian-themed congregational dinner in June, organized by Julius. That event triggered the Parish Committee contribution, and also happened to coincide with the contribution from the Alliance. Once all those things came together in June, we knew the visit would happen.

The visit went way too fast, filled with home-cooked meals with various members of the First Parish community (including Rev. Marta), sightseeing around Cambridge and Boston (including major UU sites), organizing and facilitating a Partner Church-themed service, and a relaxing weekend at Michael and Holly's home by the beach in Rockport (with a visit to the local UU church). We concluded with a well-attended community dinner.

In addition to the Partner Church Committee, I'd like to extend a huge thanks to the Bogstad and Burt families for hosting Arpad, and to Julius and Martha Pereli for hosting the four adults. Thanks as well to Jo Guthrie for all her assistance in planning the Sunday service. And a final thanks to all who hosted meals, provided transportation, attended events, and have supported the Partner Church project over the past nine years.

The visit was a much-needed boost for the partnership project, and strengthened and reinvigorated both sides. We got to share our lives here with key figures in the Gagy congregation, and return their generous hospitality from First Parish's two trips there. Now that full visits have happened in both directions, keeping the momentum moving forward is important.

Discussions have already started as to what we can do together next, with a youth work exchange near the top of the list. But we need more help to keep this going. Please e-mail partnerchurch@firstparish.info to find out how you can help.

Into the New Year



The RE wing has a new roof that should put an end to leaks. Many thanks to the Property Committee for dedicated work on this important safeguard of our building's future.

In other roofing news, our solar panels save us money every month. During the spring and summer we weren't billed *anything* for electricity — in fact we generated credits worth about \$2,800. We can use these credits to cover our bills for at least the next three months. Sustainability is alive and well at First Parish!

The Second Minister Search Committee has collected more surveys than expected (a great thing) and are reviewing the results. They will soon make the results available to the congregation.
