
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Leap Forward!


with closed eyes to dash against darkness

Our Second Minister Search

From an impressive 17 applications we have chosen three finalists, each of whom spent a weekend in Arlington. They had dinner at a committee member's home, spent all day Saturday in interviews, had a walking tour of our building and a driving tour of Arlington, and gave a sermon in a neutral pulpit. This exhaustive (and exhausting!) process was joyful and enlightening for everyone involved.

This month we will rank the finalists, alert the UUA, and hope for a happy match. Parish Committee gets the final say. Assuming all goes well, we hope to introduce our second minister next month, to start work in September.

Of course, there are no guarantees. We could lose the candidate we really want to another congregation. The UUA provides for a second round later in the spring, or we might extend the search into next year.

Dance for Dignity

On Saturday, March 14, we have the opportunity to support the good work of the ArCS Cluster, which helps refugees and asylum-seekers establish lives in our communities by mobilizing a network of local volunteers. The cluster now supports 18 people through its outreach programs, as well as a Passages program for short-term support of refugees not housed by the cluster. The ArCS Cluster was the first cluster to explicitly welcome LGBTQ asylum-seekers, and has now hosted people from Egypt, Saudi Arabia, Liberia, Libya, Pakistan, Djibouti, and Uganda.

From 7 to 10:30 pm, you can dance in the Sanctuary to classic rock from Stanley & the Undercovers, enjoy complimentary international desserts and a cash bar, and witness a fabulous set by She-Boom, "The First Post-Menopausal Brazilian Percussion Band," all the way from Somerville. We will hear from folks who've fled their homes in the hope of saving their lives.

All proceeds will support the ArCS Cluster as well as the Cambridge Foundation's United Legal Defense Fund for Immigrants, which provides critical legal services for our immigrant neighbors and friends who are being subjected to detention and deportation. The suggested donation for tickets is \$25, available in advance and at the door.

Meaningful Action on Climate Change


The Town of Arlington has a program that lets residents switch to green electricity that is generated from local renewable sources instead carbonproducing fossil fuels. At *www.arlingtoncca.com* you can find a description of the program, answers to frequently asked questions, a calculator to determine your individual costs, and an on-line form to sign up. Nearby towns have similar programs, and you can find links to those and other information at *firstparish.info/climate*.

The amount of renewable energy that Arlington residents get by default is 26 percent. You can "opt up" to increase the amount of renewables to 50 or 100 percent green energy. Opting up costs a little bit more for the electricity you use (a modestly higher amount per kilowatt hour), but it lets us contribute as individuals to a more sustainable environment by spurring development of renewable electricitygeneration capacity.

Arlington and other towns participate in an initiative called Community Choice Aggregation (CCA), which empowers us to create large buying groups to provide energy at a lower rate. Grouping residential accounts creates economies of scale and thus lower rates. It also enables residents to purchase green renewable energy.

First Parish's Climate Action Working Group, Mothers Out Front, and Sustainable Arlington are all involved in supporting this program. Please take a moment and choose to OPT-UP!
