Crossing the Divide

Our world is very polarized, with people of divergent views often unwilling to talk with each other, or even treat each other respectfully. This pattern is obvious in politics but also sometimes happens locally, even within the First Parish community, around issues like Israel and Gaza or how to respond to our history of enslavement. The STAR Committee has partnered with Braver Angels, a national organization that


fosters communication across divisions, to offer us some workshops.

The first, Depolarizing Within, examines the assumptions we bring to thoughts about people with whom we disagree. We will identify stereotypes, explore phrases that help us engage and that create distance, and discuss how to engage with those who share our views when they express contempt for people with other views.

The second, Skills for Disagreeing Better, extends these insights to communicating with people with whom we have strong differences. We will practice listening and finding common ground.

The workshops will be on Sunday, June 2, from 1:30 to 4:30 pm, and Thursday, June 6, from 7 to 8:30 pm, both in the Vestry. The first one is a prerequisite for the second. Register through our church website, at *www.firstparish.info*.


Democracy Film

A Step on the Journey

The Parish Committee has unanimously endorsed this Affirmation, crafted by our Reckoning & Repair Working Group with much input from the congregation. At our Annual Meeting on May 19 we will vote on whether to adopt it. This will be only a first step on a longer journey to right past wrongs, but it is an important, symbolic step to inspire our congregation's racial justice work going forward.

The Affirmation does not seek to answer the big questions we will inevitably have to answer. Nor does the Affirmation empower any group to make decisions about those questions for the congregation.


What the Affirmation does seek to do, however, is to positively assert our commitment to joining a larger movement that is wrestling with these questions. Other Unitarian Universalist congregations in Massachusetts — in Boston, Needham, North Andover, Hingham, Brewster, and Gloucester — are ahead of us on this journey, as are UU congregations across the country.

Sixty-one years ago this month, in his *Letter from the Birmingham Jail*, Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. reminded us that "the time is always ripe to do right." We hope that this Affirmation will inspire us to continue our journey toward justice.

Affirmation of Reckoning and Repair

Acknowledgment

To create beloved community, rooted in justice and inspired by love, we break past silences and name our congregation's entanglement with the institution of slavery, which began with the founding of the congregation in 1739. At least eight of First Parish's sixteen original pew owners enslaved Black people, and our initial congregation was founded in part on the uncompensated labor, resources, skills, and talents of enslaved people.

Commitment

First Parish Unitarian Universalist of Arlington is committed to building relationships with local, Black-led organizations to shape a framework for meaningful reparations. We commit to a process of reparations guided by people of African heritage and the broader reparations movement. and we will work within and beyond our congregation's walls to bring about holistic repair. In tandem with seeking out and forming relationships with Black-led organizations, the Reckoning & Repair working group will continue gathering congregational feedback about a plan for reparations. All annual fiscal decisions will be made by the appropriate committees within the congregation, while all longer-term fiscal commitments will be made by congregational vote.

Reparations are central to the struggle to build a world based on justice, care, and uplift, and we commit ourselves to this work. Hand in hand we will find a way.

Acknowledging This Land

At our Annual Meeting on May 19 we will vote on the statement below, which has been unanimously endorsed by our Parish Committee. This acknowledgment was crafted by our Indigenous Justice Working Group after engaging with the congregation, Indigenous consultants, our ministers, and others. Its aim is to provide witness, education, action, relationship, and support, responding to the 2020 call from the Unitarian Universalist Association to address 400 years of white supremacist colonialism. First Parish Land Acknowledgment

The First Parish meetinghouse is located on the ancestral lands of the Massachusett people, whose name was appropriated by this Commonwealth. The European colonists who took land from its inhabitants through coercion and violence also subjected Indigenous people to forced labor, relocation, and genocide. Our faith calls us to acknowledge the truth of our history, to name the ongoing harms of settler colonialism, and to work toward repair. We resolve to be in right relationship with the Massachusett and other Indigenous peoples, particularly the federally recognized Wampanoag nations of Mashpee and Aquinnah. We commit to finding meaningful ways to offer our support as we work in solidarity to build a more sustainable future for us all.

Highlights of Our Ministry Assessment

The Committee on Ministry recently completed its annual evaluation of ministry and congregational life at First Parish, through a survey and consultations with members and staff. The survey showed that our staff is serving our needs well.

Participants noted moving and thought-provoking sermons, attention to pastoral care, opportunities for spiritual development, engaging adult programming, and many social justice activities. Respondents are pleased with the abundance of programming and describe our congregation as thriving, growing, and vibrant, noting growth in service attendance and Religious Education. First Parish is seen as supportive, kind, thoughtful, joyful, and financially generous.

Improvements were suggested in three areas.

- Although many noted enhanced welcoming activities, some groups may need more focused efforts, in particular young single people, families, and LGBT+ individuals.
- With our expanded activities, finding volunteers continues to be a challenge. Participants suggest looking at different ways to reach out to volunteers as well as more communication about volunteer opportunities.
- As in past evaluations, some noted that we need to look for ways to increase the diversity of our congregation.

The Committee on Ministry greatly appreciates those who participated in this year's evaluation. The results underscore our sense of the vibrancy and health of our beloved spiritual home.
