## Got Unfinished Projects?

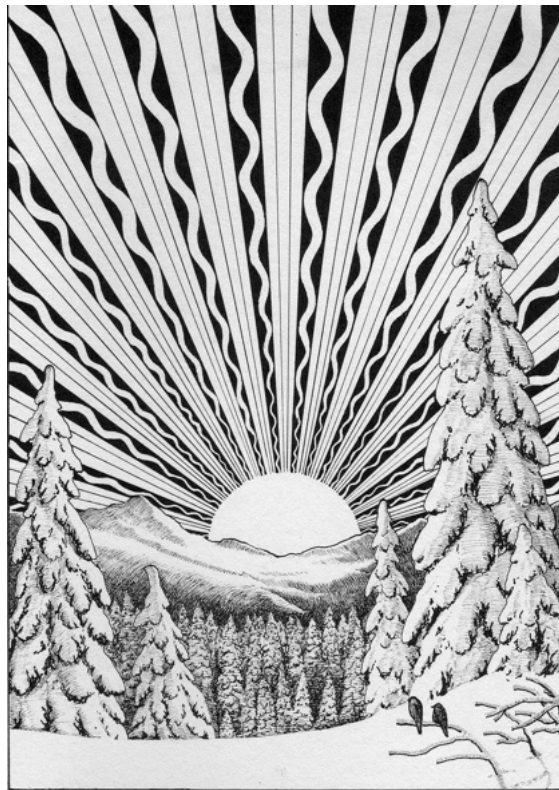

## Parish Committee Notes

We start 2026 with hope for the future, and yet our country began the year with the deaths of Keith Porter Jr., Renee Nicole Good, Alex Pretti, and others. As we mourn their loss and stand together at vigils, in protests, and by supporting community building efforts, we are reminded by guest preacher Rev. Mary Margaret Earl from the UU Urban Ministry to "widen the circle" and to be grounded in "our heads, hearts, and gut." As our guts may be talking to us and whispering "what's to come?" with anxiety, we can reach out to each other and to our neighbors. We can look forward to new ideas and experiment with creative ways to engage and participate, to make ourselves available, and to be open to hearing different and differing voices. Rev. Erica Richmond, together with testimonials by Bill Gardiner, Joanne Pohl, and Eric Segal lifted up the idea of non-cooperation. Given on January 18, the sermon "Unescapable Web" was much needed and well-timed. Talk about shining a light in the darkness of winter.

Other highlights of the December and January ParCom meetings included visits from the Defending Democracy Working Group, the Human Resources Committee, the Finance Committee, and the Transition Team.

- Defending Democracy, a working group of the Social Justice Committee, continues to take on and grapple with immigration issues. The Parish Committee heard a presentation and approved a motion to put up signs in the meetinghouse. See Joanne Pohl's article for more about this.
- The Human Resources Committee continues to work with First Parish staff. The committee suggested some upcoming updates to our employee handbook.
- First Parish welcomes our part-time A/V tech person, Lilith, who joined us in December. After six years of volunteer-led Zoom services, our Tech Team is taking a breather. A rotating group of seasoned volunteers worked in teams of three to conduct each Zoom service every Sunday. We are grateful that First Parish is in a favorable financial position and is able to alleviate the workload of our fabulous volunteers.
- The Finance Committee reviewed the budget and compiled wish lists from committees.
- The Transition Team and ParCom have been working closely with Rev. Jonipher and Rev. Erica. The Parish Committee is excited about the well-received Transition Team newsletter.

The Parish Committee held its winter retreat on January 31, part of that time hosting the Transition Team. As we turns towards our Stewardship campaign this spring, the Parish Committee supports Stewardship's efforts and reminds the congregation to pledge early and with a heart open to "what's to come" next. First Parish members give our time, talent, and treasure so that we can come together and be with each other on our spiritual journeys, centering love and honoring our past, present, and future.

## New Signs at First Parish

In response to concerns about keeping our immigrant friends safe and living our UU values, the Defending Democracy Working Group hosted a Zoom workshop in November on "Knowing Your Rights if Confronted by ICE in a House of Worship." The Massachusetts Immigration and Refugee Advocacy Coalition (MIRA) led the session. Clear legal rights and other information designed specifically for communities of faith were presented.

About 80 people signed up for the presentation, with 53 attending on Zoom. It included examples of helpful signs that identify private areas that require a warrant signed by a judge for a specific person, should ICE enter our facility. After the workshop, representatives of the Defending Democracy group met with the Parish Committee and agreed to place such signs at First Parish.

We are aware that the current risk for ICE entering our building is low, yet we believe it is important to have basic protections in place. We see this as one step in creating a place of welcome, inclusion, and safety.

Beyond signs, we hope to train any public-facing congregational volunteers and staff on how to respond to ICE if they were to come to our building. Defending Democracy hosted a wonderful de-escalation training run by UUMass Action last June, and further training at First Parish is in the works.

In the minister's office area signs will look like this:

### ***WELCOME!***

All are welcome into our space for prayer, reflection, and community-building. We do not tolerate violence, discrimination, or harassment. Weapons are not permitted on the property.

### **PRIVATE PROPERTY NOTICE**

This room is private property. Unauthorized entry, including by immigration enforcement, without a judicial warrant, is not permitted.

In other areas such as the Parlor, Music Room, Green Room, and Custodians' area, signs will simply read PRIVATE. These signs are meant to help all of us feel safe and welcome. ## Peter Southwick's Photos

The next exhibit in the Parlor will feature work by longtime member Peter Southwick, who passed in September 2025. Entitled "Where I've Been, What I've Seen," it documents Peter's travels and will run from February 7 to the week of April 6.

Peter retired in 2017 as Associate Professor of Journalism in the College of Communication at Boston University, following a career that included ten years on the staff of the Associated Press and nine years as Director of Photography at the *Boston Globe*.

Peter moved to the Boston area to attend Harvard and earned his BA in Government, but much of his undergraduate life was spent taking photographs for *The Harvard Crimson*, the university's daily paper.

He entered professional journalism at *The Real Paper*, an alternative weekly in Cambridge. A freelance career followed that included work for *Newsweek*, *Time*, and *Parade*. He joined the photography staff of the *Boston Herald American* in 1978, and covered such stories as the visit of Pope John Paul II, the Tall Ships parade, and the 1980 presidential campaign.

In late 1980, Peter became a staff photographer in the Boston bureau of the Associated Press. He traveled extensively within the U.S., covering everything from the World Series and the Super Bowl to political conventions and presidential inaugurations. His photos earned awards from the National Press Photographers Association, the Boston Press Photographers Association, National Headliners Awards, and the Associated Press.

Peter returned to newspaper work in 1990 as photo editor of the *Boston Globe*, and after two years was promoted to Director of Photography. He left the *Globe* and joined Boston University faculty in 2002.

Peter moved to Arlington in 1977. He and his wife, Jean Rosenberg, have lived here since 1980. More of Peter's work can be seen on his website, [petersouthwick.smugmug.com](http://petersouthwick.smugmug.com).
