About our Alliance Sunday Preacher

From one classroom in Brookline, Massachusetts in 1976, Facing History & Ourselves has become a global organization with a network of hundreds of thousands of middle and secondary school educators reaching millions of students worldwide.

Facing History & Ourselves helps educators prepare students to participate in civic life—using empathy, ethics, and choice to stand up to bigotry and hate in their own lives, communities, and schools. Their curriculum is taught in every US state and over 100 countries around the world.

Lara James is Chief Marketing and Communications Officer of Facing History & Ourselves. Since Lara began in 2017, Facing History's educator network has more than doubled to over 300,000 active educators.

Before joining Facing History, Lara served as Vice President of Brand Marketing for MassMutual, and prior to that in a similar position at Capital One. Lara started her career at Temple, Barker and Sloane on Hayden Avenue in Lexington after receiving a BA in History from Oberlin College.

Raised in Lexington, her family attended Follen Church Unitarian Universalist before they joined the Religious Society of Friends in Cambridge. Lara and her husband have three adult sons and live in Amherst MA.

Facing History and Ourselves

The mission of Facing History & Ourselves is to use lessons of history to challenge teachers and their students to stand up to bigotry and hate.

Since the late 1970s, the group claims to have trained over 10,000 teachers, who have taught over half a million students in the U.S. and Canada. The curriculum is now also used in Israel, Northern Ireland, South Africa and China. The course is aimed at middle school and high school students. In the classroom, students take part in group discussions and use primary source material to learn about different historical events. The curriculum aims to create a history course with a reflective component, allowing students to think about modern day prejudices. The semester-long class starts with learning about the impact of the individual in society and how one is affected by his or her environment and culture. Students then learn about governments and the roles citizens play in their nation, and talk about the effects of bystanders in society. Classes gradually move into talking about dehumanization and how different societal groups can turn against each other, threatening a democracy. The course is taught by looking into racial segregation in the United States. Students also learn about the Armenian genocide, Cambodian Genocide, and the history of Native Americans and Japanese Americans in the USA. The final subject focused on is antisemitism and Nazi Germany.

The course aims to connect the events with the students' lives by calling for reflection. Students are asked to think about familiar subjects such as peer pressure, conformity, and belongingness. The course's goal is to help students realize their role in society, and to promote global citizenship so that future events like the ones discussed can be prevented.

Upcoming Congregational Vote on Indigenous Justice and Reckoning and Repair

Both the Reckoning and Repair group and the Indigenous Justice Working Group have been hard at work these past years. After a lot of congregational education, presentations, and listening sessions, they have integrated the community's feedback. On Tuesday, April 16th, each group presented to the Parish Committee. The Parish Committee unanimously endorsed both resolutions printed below, and voted to add both statements to the May Annual Meeting warrant. The congregation will vote on whether or not to adopt these resolutions on May 19th at the Annual Meeting.

Resolved, that First Parish adopt the following Land Acknowledgement statement:

The First Parish meetinghouse is located on the ancestral lands of the Massachusett people, whose name was appropriated by this Commonwealth. The European colonists who took land from its inhabitants through coercion and violence also subjected Indigenous people to forced labor, relocation, and genocide. Our faith calls us to acknowledge the truth of our history, to name the ongoing harms of settler colonialism, and to work toward repair. We resolve to be in right relationship with the Massachusett and other Indigenous peoples, particularly the federally recognized Wampanoag nations of Mashpee and Aquinnah. We commit to finding meaningful ways to offer our support as we work in solidarity to build a more sustainable future for us all.

Resolved, that First Parish adopt the following Affirmation of Reckoning and Repair:

Acknowledgement: To create beloved community, rooted in justice and inspired by love, we break past silences and name our congregation's entanglement with the institution of slavery, which began with the founding of the congregation in 1739. At least eight of First Parish's sixteen original pew owners enslaved Black people, and our initial congregation was founded in part on the uncompensated labor, resources, skills, and talents of enslaved people.

Commitment: First Parish Unitarian Universalist of Arlington is committed to building relationships with local, Black-led organizations to shape a framework for meaningful reparations. We commit to a process of reparations guided by people of African heritage and the broader reparations movement, and we will work within and beyond our congregation's walls to bring about holistic repair. In tandem with seeking out and forming relationships with Black-led organizations, the Reckoning & Repair working group will continue gathering congregational feedback about a plan for reparations. All annual fiscal decisions will be made by the appropriate committees within the congregation, while all longer-term fiscal commitments will be made by congregational vote.

Reparations are central to the struggle to build a world based on justice, care, and uplift, and we commit ourselves to this work. Hand in hand we will find a way.
