

# Christmas Eve Candlelight Worship Tuesday, December 24, 2024

Services at 4 pm and 6 pm

Today the sun sets at 4:16 pm and rises tomorrow at 7:12 am.

Today we received 9 hours and 4 minutes of sunlight,

24 seconds more than last Saturday, the winter solstice.

By the summer solstice on June 20

we will receive 15 hours and seventeen minutes of daylight.

# **Lighting of the Chalice and Ringing of the Bell**Caroline Steuart, chalice lighter at 4 pm

The historic First Parish bell is struck nine and then four times for the nine hours and four minutes of sunlight today. The church bell was saved from the church fire in 1975.

The chalice is a symbol of our liberal faith
dating to the heresies of Jan Hus
in sixteenth-century Czechoslovakia.
Jan Hus welcomed all to the communion table
and spoke not in Latin but in the people's tongue.
The chalice of the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee
was also a symbol of safety for refugees of Nazi Europe.

The silver bowl we use as our chalice Dates from 1852 and was used by The Frit Congregational Church of West Cambridge, Earlier names of First Parish and of Arlington.

## **Tonight's Musicians**



The Worcester Brass Consort, founded and directed by Dr. Douglas Weeks, is comprised of professional brass players from Eastern and Central Massachusetts. The ensemble has performed throughout New England and presented programs at the Worcester Art Museum, Mechanics Hall, St. Paul's Cathedral, WPI's Alden Hall, The

College of the Holy Cross, WGBH Radio. For several years it appeared with the Worcester Mastersingers at their annual Boar's Head program. Individually, its members perform or have performed with major regional orchestras in New England. The director, Douglas Weeks, is professor emeritus of music at Worcester Polytechnic Institute.

**Andrew Shenton** is a scholar, prize-winning author, performer, educator, consultant, cultural historian, and administrator based in Boston, Massachusetts. He currently serves as Professor of Music, James R. Houghton Scholar of Sacred Music and Director, Master of Sacred Music Program at Boston University. Born in England, his first professional music training was at The Royal College of Music in London, where he studied under a scholarship from The Royal College of Organists. Dr. Shenton has a master's degree in organ performance from Yale and holds the Fellowship diploma of the Royal College of Organists. He has toured in Europe and the US as a conductor, recitalist, and clinician, and his three solo organ recordings have received international acclaim. In addition to diplomas in both piano and organ Dr. Shenton holds the Choir Training diploma of the Royal College of Organists. A noted choral conductor, Dr. Shenton has numerous recording and producing credits notably with the Navona label. He maintains an active performance career because he believes it is important that any scholarly engagement with the arts is not divorced from its creation and performance.

First Parish is a meeting place for many in the area. When the meetinghouse was closed due to COVID, our sanctuary was used by FoodLink to distribute food to the hungry. Many community music groups perform here. Social Justice groups organize within our walls. Each Sunday we give half our offering to good causes in the community. To date we have donated more than \$200,000.

# Religious Education at First Parish

Religious Education for children, in grades PreK through Seven, meets during Sunday worship. The Nursery is open for babies and toddlers. Carefully selected curriculum, based on Unitarian Universalist values, encourages the children to think beyond themselves, to delve deeper into spiritual and theological ideas, and to connect with trusted adults with whom they can share their thoughts. Children are given the tools and resources with which to answer their religious questions, study the natural world, and ponder the mystery and awe of the universe.

Middle and High School teens meet on Sunday evenings. We offer a comprehensive Sexuality Education program (OWL) for our 7th graders and Coming of Age program for those in 8th grade. Our high school youth group program is based on a Teen Empowerment model in which the teens elect officers, collectively make decisions about the content of their weekly gatherings, serve others, worship together, and build strong bonds with their peers.
