





Cecilia Helena Payne-Gaposchkin was born in Britian in 1900. Throughout her childhood, she took a keen interest in the study of the natural world and the heavens. In college at Cambridge University, which was still an unwelcoming place for women in science, she heard a lecture on the findings of a recent eclipse. It propelled her commitment to astronomy, the study of stars. To find a place for her graduate work, she moved to Cambridge, MA, researching in at the Harvard Observatory. Writing her thesis, she discovered the chemical composition of stars, and that hydrogen and helium are by far the most abundant elements in stars. Overcoming barriers for female scientists, her work on the cosmic makeup of the universe and the nature of variable stars was foundational to modern astrophysics. She was appointed Harvard's first female Professor and female Department Chair. When she lived in the area, she attended the First Parish UU of Lexington, MA, and taught Sunday school there regularly.
