Worship in the Meetinghouse Sanctuary and Online

The sun rose at 5:08am and will set at 8:20pm *in sh'allah* bringing us 15 hours, 12 minutes of sunlight, 8 minutes more than last Sunday. The moon is waxing toward its fullness on Wednesday.

For Christians today is Pentecost, the commemoration of the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the followers of Jesus after his death. Pentecost is considered the "birthday" of the Christan Church and comes fifty days after Easter.

June is Pride Month for LBTGQ+ peoples. Thursday is the Pulse Night of Remembrance, an annual testament to the work still to be done for equality. It is also a powerful illustration of hope, resilience, and the healing power of community. The Pulse nightclub was a known sanctuary for the LGBTQ+ community in Orlando, FL On June 12, 2016, a shooting left 49 dead and 50 wounded. It is the most significant single act of violence against the LGBTQ+ community in the US. Today our blue LGBTQ+ chalice is lit for the Pulse Night of Remembrance, which is today.

Notes:

"Bidden or unbidden, God is present" is attributed to Erasmus of Rotterdam, 1563.

"Abba" and "Emma" are Hebrew for "Papa" and "Mama."

"Hineni" is Hebrew for "Here I am" or "I am ready, willing." In the Hebrew Bible, it is uttered most often in response to God, but also spoken from one individual to another. When the word "Hineni" is used, it signifies a turning point, a potential life-changing moment requiring decision, action, and resolution.

And times of plague!

You have stood up with us, sat down with us, spoken words of wisdom to us and opened your heart to us throughout the passages of our lives. Comforting us in times of sickness, trouble and grief. Blessing our unions. Celebrating the births and arrivals of our children.

Your sermons have educated us, challenged us, inspired us and drawn us into ever deeper communion with the Holy, however we have chosen to define it.

You have cultivated in us capacities we did not know we possessed. For pastoral care. For preaching. For prayer. And for leadership. Capacities we are confident will guide us in this, our time of transition, and sustain us in your absence.

From 3,000 years ago come the words of Ecclesiastes:

For everything there is a season: a time to weep and a time to laugh; a time to mourn and a time to dance; a time to seek and a time to lose; a time to seek and a time to lose; a time to keep and a time to throw away; a time to tear and a time to sew; a time to keep silent and a time to speak; A time to be born and a time to die; A time to plant and a time to pluck up what is planted. Today we say farewell, Marta, and Godspeed. To facilitate a gentle and harmonious transition to a new beginning, we have a ceremony of 'releasing' for us all. At this time, I invite those who have served as chair of the Parish Committee during Marta's tenure at First Parish to join her at the front of the sanctuary.

Become a Worship Associate or Lay Minister

The Shared Ministry Committee is seeking several members of the congregation to join the Lay Ministry and the Worship Associates, two important programs serving our community.

Lay Ministers work with First Parish clergy to provide pastoral care for members of the community, 'supporting one another through the changes in our lives.' Lay Ministry applicants have a natural bent for listening and compassion, as well as the ability to maintain professional and personal boundaries and confidentiality.

Worship Associates have a public presence in Sunday services and support the organization of services throughout the year, including facilitating the series of summer services. Those interested in becoming Worship Associates should have a deep interest in worship, be comfortable speaking before the congregation, have good organizational skills, and the ability to speak candidly but kindly.

Lay Ministers and Worship Associates:

- must be First Parish Members
- meet monthly as a group with a minister
- serve two-year terms (starting in the fall)
- may serve for up to three consecutive terms

Application, Training and Installation:

- Online applications are due by Wednesday, June 11
- Applicants will be interviewed and selected by the Shared Ministry Committee in June
- Lay Ministry Training: September 21 (half-day)
- Worship Associate Training: August 9 (half-day); October 18 (full-day training)
- Installations for each group occur during Sunday worship services early in the church year
